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## How do we keep you safe?



We want you to know that you can talk with us about anything, even if it feels awful or small. This might be about home, school or the Church of England community.

## Your Choir

Should be a safe place where you can enjoy being a chorister.

You should feel comfortable to ask questions, express your opinion and to learn more about music, Christian faith, spirituality and how it relates to your life.

Expects you to:

- Attend rehearsals unless you are unwell or have an important appointment.
- Try your best at all times



Should never touch you in a way that is upsetting or involves you keeping a secret. Sometimes, if you are sad they might want to give you a hug. This should only be if you have said yes.

If they give you a lift they should have your parent's permission.



Should treat you with respect.



If they want to take a photograph of you they should have permission from you and your parents.



Should help you if there is anything you don't understand.

Should not be on their own with you unless they have special permission from your parents and the vicar. This might be the case if you are having a music lesson or a mentoring session.



## Your leaders and helpers

Should not be friends with you on social media through their personal account. They should message in a group chat or with your parents.



Should set a good example to you in the way that they behave, they should not be rude or have favourite children.
